Yukon

Part 1 – Summary Statement

1.1 Introduction

The aim of the Yukon Kindergarten to Grade 12 education system is to enable all students to develop their individual potential and to acquire knowledge, skills, and abilities needed to graduate with an education that is relevant to, and representative of their lives and community. Yukon's education system expresses a committed approach to our Yukon First Nations' content and ways of knowing, doing, and being.

Yukon Education works with First Nations communities and governments to develop school programs. Formal education agreements have been signed between the Government of Yukon and some First Nations. This has led to the development of curriculum and programs in the traditional territories of those First Nations. For example, through our agreement with the Tr'ondëk Hwëch'in, we have accredited three cultural camps: First Hunt, First Fish, and Spring Camp.

Yukon First Nations culture is incorporated into many courses and programs in Yukon schools. *Residential schools, Our Stories of Residential Schools in Yukon and Canada*, is now part of the mandatory Social Studies 10 course. *Social Studies (Grade 5): Yukon First Nations Governance; and Yukon First Nations Citizenship.*

Ancestral Technology (Grades 10 and 11): English First Peoples (Grades 10, 11 and 12); and BC First Nations Studies (Grade 12).

Furthermore, in Yukon's education system there are experiential learning programs with a Yukon First Nations' focus. Such as, Community, Heritage, Arts, Outdoors and Skills (CHAOS) program at Wood Street Centre in Whitehorse (Grades 9 and 10); Tr'ondëk Hwëch'in Traditional Camp at Robert Service School in Dawson City; and land-based experiential education with the Vuntut Gwich'in First Nation at Chief Zzeh Gittlit School in Old Crow.

The curriculum model is made up of three elements: Content, Curricular Competencies, and Big Ideas. Three elements, the Content (Know), Curricular Competencies (Do), and Big Ideas (Understand) all work together to support deeper learning. Educators combine the three elements in ways they see fit to personalize learning in their classrooms. All areas of learning are based on a "Know-Do-Understand" model to support a concept-based and competency-driven approach to learning.

Content is the essential knowledge that students must learn at each grade level. Students are expected to know the content.

Curricular Competencies are explicit statements of what is expected at each grade level in each area of learning. Curricular Competencies are the skills, strategies, and processes that students develop over time and apply to their ongoing lifelong learning. Curricular Competencies are unique to each area of learning. Students are expected to be able to demonstrate (do) the Curricular Competencies.

Big Ideas consist of generalizations, principles, and the key concepts important within an area of learning. Big Ideas represent what students will understand at the completion of their grades in each area of learning. These concepts extend beyond a single grade and help build a broad base for a student's future understanding.

These elements are all woven together to form the curriculum structure in the following manner:

- Understand the Big Ideas and concepts that can be transferred to other settings.
- Demonstrate (do) and apply the Curricular Competencies within each area of learning.
- Know the content of each of the subject areas.

Core Competencies are sets of intellectual, personal, social, and emotional proficiencies that all students need to engage in deep, lifelong learning. Core Competencies underpin the curricular competencies in all areas of learning. They are directly related to the educated citizen and as such are what we value for all students in the system. The Core Competencies are

Communication (communicating and collaborating), Thinking (creative, critical, and reflective thinking), and Personal and Social awareness and responsibility, positive personal and cultural identity, social awareness, and responsibility).

Literacy is defined as the ability to understand, critically analyze, and create a variety of forms of communication, including oral, written, visual, digital, and multimedia, to accomplish one's goals. Numeracy is defined as the ability to understand and apply mathematical concepts, processes, and skills to solve problems in a variety of contexts. While they are commonly associated with language learning and mathematics, literacy and numeracy are fundamental to, and applied in, all areas of learning.

1.2 Organization of School System

The Yukon education system is divided into three levels: primary (Kindergarten to Grade 3), intermediate (Grades 4 to 9), and graduation years (Grades 10 to 12). (https://www2.gov.bc.ca/assets/gov/education/administration/kindergarten-to-grade-12/graduation/handbook of procedures.pdf)

Each level of the Yukon education system emphases a range of knowledge, skills, and attitudes that students develop. These skills are developed through competency-based curriculum and standards-based assessment demonstrated through inquiry-based approaches and studies in English language arts, mathematics, science, social studies, fine arts, and applied design skills and technologies from Kindergarten to Grade 12. The competency-based approach is comprised of prescribed curriculum to ensure all students — not solely those planning to go to university — gain the thinking, communication, personal, and social skills needed to become lifelong learners who are aware of themselves and connected to their communities.

Yukon Education sets high-level policies, monitors system performance, and distributes funding, while school authorities are responsible for the day-to-day operation of schools and the delivery of educational programs to students.

Yukon Education serves as a government body as well as a school authority (with 20 schools in its direct authority). Two other school authorities exist in Yukon; the Commission scolaire francophone du Yukon (CSFY) (with three schools) and the First Nations School Board (FNSB) (with 11 schools as of SY23/24), including summer schools and online learning schools incorporated within the entire education system.

1.3 Explanation of Terms Used (including special-education/student-services terms)

Ministry-Authorized Courses

BC's Course Registry (www.bced.gov.bc.ca/datacollections/course registry web search/search-home.en.php) lists courses authorized by the Ministry of Education and Child Care, including both curricula developed by the ministry and external credentials approved by the ministry. (See External Credential Courses, below.) The Course Registry includes course titles and codes, grade levels, and the number of credits students can earn for each course.

Locally Developed Courses

Locally developed courses are Grades 10, 11, or 12 non-credit courses developed by a local school. The courses are based on subject matter from a particular field of knowledge and on a skill set selected and organized by a particular school or school district. However, it is required that specific course codes be used as described in the *B.C. Graduation Program Handbook of Procedures* (https://www2.gov.bc.ca/assets/gov/education/administration/kindergarten-to-grade-12/graduation/handbook of procedures.pdf) for reporting course enrollment and completion, and use of these codes must be approved by the school authority. Locally developed courses count towards elective credits towards graduation. These courses are approved by the Minister of Education and/or delegate.

External Credential Courses

These courses are organized sets of learning activities that fall outside the British Columbia school curriculum and are listed in the Course Registry (e.g., Royal Conservatory of Music). Students receive graduation credit for successfully completing an external course. These courses are of an educational standard deemed equivalent to or exceeding that of ministry-authorized

Grade 10, 11, or 12 courses.

Independent Directed Studies (IDS) Courses

Independent Directed Studies (IDS) courses are student-initiated and conducted under teacher supervision. These courses are based on the content of ministry-developed or Board/Authority-Authorized Grades 10 to 12 courses. An IDS course can be for 1, 2, 3, or 4 credits, where 1 credit represents, the value attached to the knowledge, skills, and attitudes most students can acquire in approximately thirty hours of instruction. Although IDS is intended to allow students to pursue curriculum in more detail or to focus on only some of the content of a course that has not been taken, IDS can also be used to recognize learning in courses students do not complete.

Post-Secondary (Dual Credit) Courses

These courses, offered from qualifying post-secondary institutions, lead to a post-secondary credential. A student presenting a transcript from a recognized institution showing successful completion of a post-secondary course that leads to a credential is entitled to have that course count towards secondary school graduation.

Yukon School Completion ("Evergreen") Certificate

Yukon School Completion ("Evergreen") Certificate is intended to celebrate success in learning that is not recognized in the Yukon School Certificate of Graduation (Dogwood Diploma). It is used to recognize the accomplishments of students with disabilities who have an Individual Education Plan (see *Individual Education Plan*, below) and have met the goals of their education, other than graduation. The Evergreen Certificate is not a graduation credential; students who receive an Evergreen certificate have not graduated. The Yukon School Completion Certificate is a specifically designed certificate, distinct from the Dogwood Diploma.

In addition to receiving an Evergreen Certificate, Yukon Education provides students with a BC Ministry transcript showing all credit and locally developed courses completed that also contains a statement indicating that the student has been issued a Yukon School Completion Certificate. The Transcript of Grades provides prospective employers and post-secondary institutions with relevant information about the student's accomplishments. A French version of the Evergreen Certificate is available upon request.

Individual Education Plan (IEP)

An Individual Education Plan (IEP) is a documented plan developed for a student with special needs that describes individualized goals, adaptations, modifications, and the services to be provided, and it includes measures for tracking achievement.

Career Programs

Career programs are local educational programs, focusing on a career or career sector that combine related, in-school coursework with a work experience component. Career program participation appears on a student's transcript. Information concerning career programs can be found at https://www2.gov.bc.ca/gov/content/education-training/k-12/support/career-programs.

1.4 Course Designation

Courses at the Grades 10 to 12 levels are assigned an official code that includes the course name and grade level. For example, French 11 (FR 11) is the Grade 11 French course. Locally developed courses carry the designation "LD" at the beginning of the title and "X" at the beginning of the code, whereas board/authority-authorized courses begin with a "Y." External courses use a "U" at the beginning of the code. Independent directed studies courses are coded with the prefix "IDS" followed by the regular course code for the related ministry-developed or board/authority-authorized course. Post-secondary courses that count towards graduation use "PSI" at the beginning of the code, and the name of the post-secondary institution where the course was completed shows on the transcript.

1.5 Time Allotments and Course Load.

In Grades 4 to 9, minimum time allotments expressed as percentages of total instructional time are recommended for each required area of study. They suggest the priority Yukon Education expects schools to give to each area of study. It is up to each

school to design a timetable appropriate for all students. Variation in the recommended times is allowed to address the learning needs of individual students and the specific needs of communities.

Yukon Education does not specify required hours of instruction per course, but rather focuses on evidence of student learning to demonstrate that each learning standard has been met. This can vary in time depending on the student's needs.

The total number of annual instructional hours for Kindergarten is 853, for Grades 1–7 is 878, and for Grades 8–12 is 952.

1.6 Curriculum Organization

Yukon implements BC's curriculum, and it is organized in to "typical" disciplines. More information is available at http://www.curriculum.gov.bc.ca. Additional details are included in Section 2 for courses included in BC's graduation program.

Students in Yukon's graduation program must complete at least 80 credits of Grades 10 to 12 coursework to satisfy minimum graduation requirements. (See Section 1.9, below for more detail regarding graduation credit.) The length and scope of courses are reflected in the credit value awarded to them. Courses may have a value of 1, 2, 3, or 4 credits. Historically, a 4-credit course is between 100–120 hours of instructional time. Most courses are worth 4 credits.

1.7 Prerequisites and/or Co-requisites

There are no prerequisites for senior secondary ministry courses; however, students are usually recommended to complete the lower-level course before enrolling in the next level. Schools, in consultation with school authorities, parents and students, inform appropriate placement decisions.

1.8 <u>Assessment and Evaluation Practices; and Transcripts (including issuing authority)</u>

For Kindergarten to Grade 9, a four-point Provincial Proficiency Scale is used to communicate student learning in all areas of learning. The four points of the scale are *Emerging, Developing, Proficient,* and *Extending*. For students in Grades 10 to 12, letter grades indicating students' level of performance in relation to the learning standards set out in the curriculum for each course are accompanied by percentage marks. The successful completion of a course numbered 10, 11, or 12 requires a minimum grade of C- or 50 per cent. Yukon follows assessment guidelines as set out in Communicating Student Learning Applebook.

Permanent Student Record

The purpose of the permanent student record is to record the history of a student's education program from Kindergarten through Grade 12. Copies can be requested from the last Yukon or BC school in which the student was enrolled. The permanent student record must be retained by school districts for 55 years after a student has withdrawn or graduated from school.

Transcript of Grades

Transcripts showing a student's results in Grades 10, 11, and 12 courses are produced centrally by Yukon Education. A transcript is the official document that indicates successful completion of Grades 10, 11, and 12 courses, course achievement levels, program participation, and how many graduation requirement credits have been completed. Transcripts only record successfully completed courses. If a student has repeated a course, only the highest mark is reported on the transcript.

1.9 <u>List of Graduation Credentials (including credentials giving access to postsecondary education), Requirements for Graduation, and Issuing Authorities</u>

Successful completion of a graduation-level educational program is recognized through the awarding of a Yukon Certificate of Graduation (the Dogwood Diploma). There are two graduation programs leading to a Dogwood Diploma: the Yukon

Graduation Program (2023) and the Adult Graduation Program. Students who successfully complete provincial adult graduation requirements are awarded the Yukon Adult Graduation Diploma (the Adult Dogwood Diploma).

School Completion Certificates, in contrast, are intended to recognize the accomplishments of students who have succeeded in meeting goals of their educational program other than graduation and are especially intended to recognize the accomplishments of students with disabilities who complete the goals and objectives stated in their Individual Education Plan.

The following information describes the Dogwood Diploma and the requirements for graduation for Yukon (2023) and Adult Graduation programs.

Dogwood Diploma

The Dogwood Diploma is the Yukon/BC Certificate of Graduation for the province's graduation programs. A student who meets the applicable graduation requirements (Yukon Graduation Program [2023] or Adult Graduation Program) is entitled to receive a Dogwood Diploma (or Adult Dogwood Diploma in the Adult Graduation program). A French version of the Dogwood Diploma is issued to students who meet requirements for the Programme francophone or French Immersion program.

Yukon Graduation Program (2023)

To graduate, students must earn a minimum of 80 credits, which include Required Courses (52 credits) and Elective Credits (minimum 28 credits).

- Elective Credits are additional credits earned by students to support their academic, career, or personal interests.
- Of the 80 credits needed for graduation, at least 16 credits must be at the Grade 12 level, including a required Grade 12 language arts course (4 credits) and the required Career Life Connections course (4 credits). The remaining required 8, Grade 12-level credits may be from Required Courses or Elective Courses.
- Effective July 1, 2023: At least 4 credits must include Indigenous-focused coursework
 (https://www2.gov.bc.ca/gov/content/education-training/k-12/sup-port/indigenous-focused-graduation-requirements).
- Students earn elective credits for locally developed courses.

Students in English must complete three graduation assessments to graduate:

- The Grade 10 Numeracy Assessment
- The Grade 10 Literacy Assessment
- The Grade 12 Literacy Assessment

Students in French Immersion must complete the following to graduate:

- French Immersion students can earn both a Yukon Certificate of Graduation (Dogwood Diploma) and a Diplôme de fin d'études secondaires. To graduate with both diplomas, French Immersion students must meet the graduation requirements for the Dogwood Diploma along with the completion of four provincial Graduation Assessments:
 - The Grade 10 Numeracy Assessment
 - The Grade 10 Literacy Assessment
 - The Grade 12 Literacy Assessment
 - Évaluation de littératie 12 français langue seconde immersion

Students in Core French (Francophone) must complete the following to graduate:

- Francophone students can earn both a Yukon Certificate of Graduation (Dogwood Diploma) and a Diplôme de fin d'études secondaires. To graduate with both diplomas, Francophone students must meet the graduation requirements for the Dogwood Diploma along with the completion of five provincial Graduation Assessments:
 - The Grade 10 Numeracy Assessment
 - o The Grade 10 Literacy Assessment
 - o The Grade 12 Literacy Assessment
 - Évaluation de littératie 10 français langue première
 - o Évaluation de littératie 12 français langue première

Required Courses

52 credits are required from the following:

- Career-Life Education (4 credits) and Career Life Connections (4 credits)
- Physical and Health Education 10 (4 credits)
- Science 10 (4 credits) and Science 11 or 12 (4 credits)
- Social Studies 10 (4 credits) and Social Studies 11 or 12 (4 credits)
- a Math 10 (4 credits) and a Math 11 or 12 (4 credits)
- a Language Arts 10, 11 and a required 12 (12 credits total)

an Arts Education 10, 11, or 12, and/or an Applied Design, Skills, and Technologies (ADST) 10, 11, or 12 (4 credits)

Elective Credits

Students must earn at least 28 elective credits. These credits can be for the following:

- Additional Grades 10, 11, or 12 Ministry-Developed Courses
- External Credentials
- Board/Authority-Authorized Courses
- Post-secondary Credits, and/or
- Independent Directed Studies

Indigenous-focused Graduation Requirement

Students are also required to complete at least 4 credits in Indigenous-focused coursework. There is no change to the total number of credits required to graduate, which remains at 80. Courses used to meet this requirement may also be used to meet other graduations requirements (e.g., English First Peoples 12 would meet both this requirement and the Grade 12 Language Arts requirement).

The B.C. Graduation Program Policy Guide (https://www2.gov.bc.ca/assets/gov/education/kindergarten-to-grade-12/support/graduation/graduation-policy-guide.pdf) includes a table indicating which Ministry-developed courses satisfy required course requirements. The Course Registry

Adult Graduation Program

Learners who are 18 years of age or older can combine credits earned at both secondary and post-secondary schools towards a Yukon Adult Graduation Diploma (Adult Dogwood Diploma). Adult learners may also pursue a regular Dogwood Diploma. To complete the Adult Graduation Program, adult students must earn at least 20 credits in the secondary system (five, 4-credit courses) or complete five courses in the post-secondary system. Courses and credits can be counted from Yukon school system and/or from a college Adult Basic Education program. This is a common credential between both secondary and post-secondary systems in Yukon/BC and is recognized as true secondary school graduation, along with the regular Grade 12 Dogwood Diploma.

- Accounting 11 and 12 count as a mathematics requirement on Adult Dogwood Diploma only.
- Students working on the Adult Dogwood cannot use Board/Authority-Authorized courses for credit.

Of the five courses required for the Adult Dogwood Diploma, at least three must be completed **after** the adult student has entered the Adult Graduation Program, either through enrolment (instruction) or Prior Learning Assessment. This means that students can receive credit toward the Adult Dogwood Diploma for no more than two qualifying courses completed while in the Yukon (school-aged) Graduation Program. Learners cannot receive an Adult Dogwood Diploma using only courses completed prior to enrolling in the Adult Graduation Program.

Adult learners are not required to complete the Graduation Numeracy or Literacy Assessments to graduate with the Adult Dogwood Diploma.

Yukon School Completion Certificate

The Yukon Completion Certificate is awarded to students with disabilities who meet the goals of their educational program other than graduation. A French version of the Yukon School Completion Certificate is available upon request. (See Section 1.3 for more information.)

1.10 Other types of Programs

Online Learning

Online learning is a classroom alternative. It used to be called distributed learning. With this style of learning, students:

- connect with their Yukon certified teacher from anywhere in Yukon using the internet, phone, or mail;
- work with their teacher to reach goals in their learning plan;
- take a program or course online or by web conferencing, teleconferencing, or correspondence; and
- get support through opportunities for in-person learning and interactions with other students.

Students sign up for online learning with an Online Learning School. Online learning continues to provide a flexible option for students to learn from home that meets education standards.

1.11 Assessment of Out-of-Province/Out-of-Territory and Foreign Studies.

Decisions regarding the assessment and placement of out-of-province and foreign students are made within each school authority, in consultation with Yukon Education. Most often, school placement recommendations are made by a school administrator in collaboration with a Yukon Education Consultant. If additional information is needed, the International Credential Evaluation Service (ICES) can be contacted. ICES was established as a national service evaluating international education credentials and is operated by the British Columbia Institute of Technology (BCIT).
